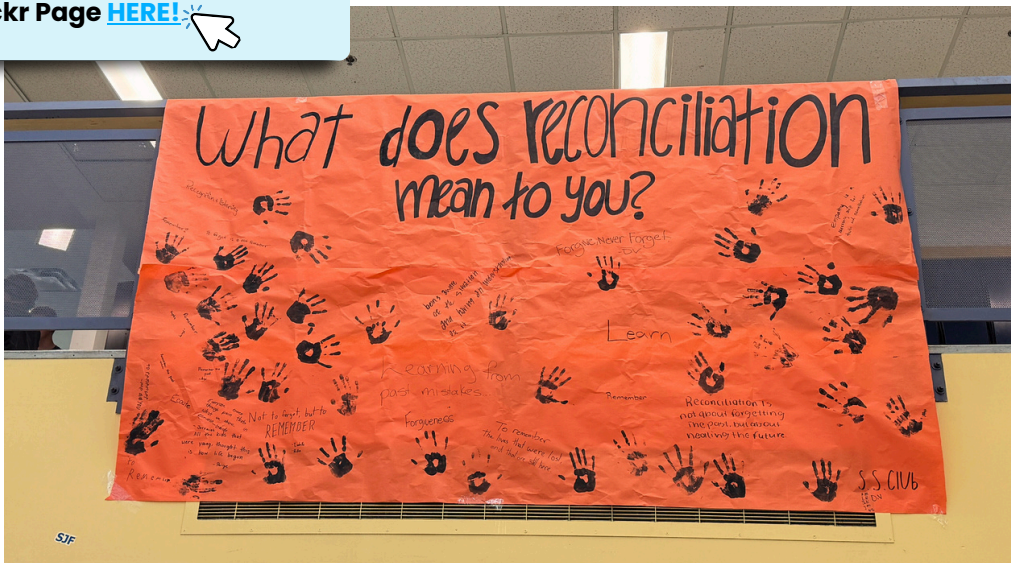


# TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

It was a wonderful day and they did a great job!

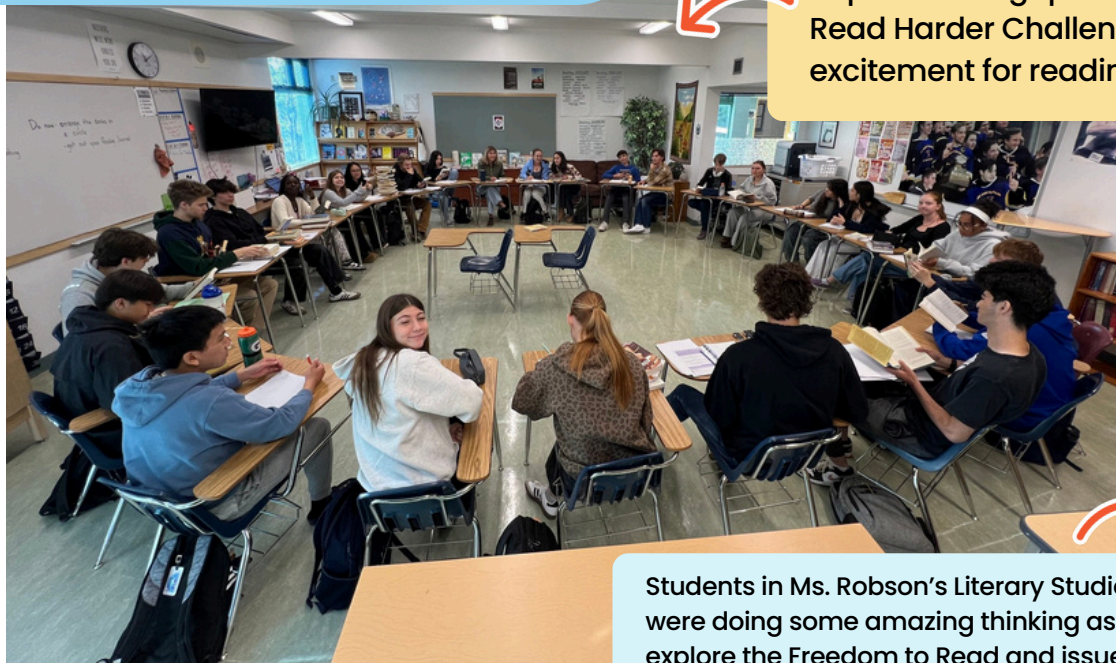

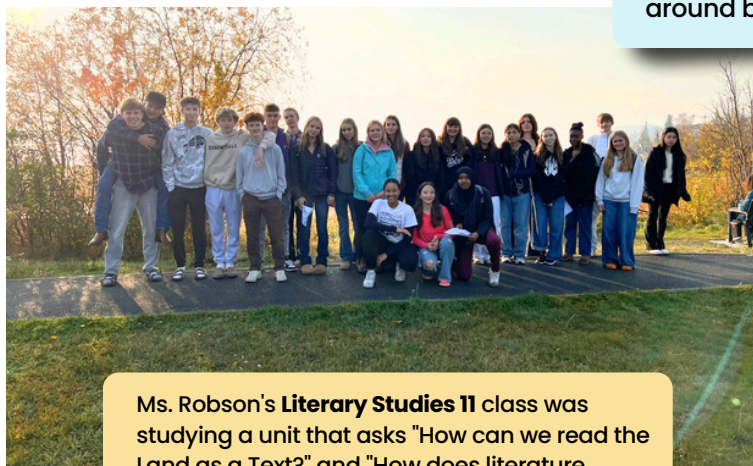
## ENGLISH LANGUAGE



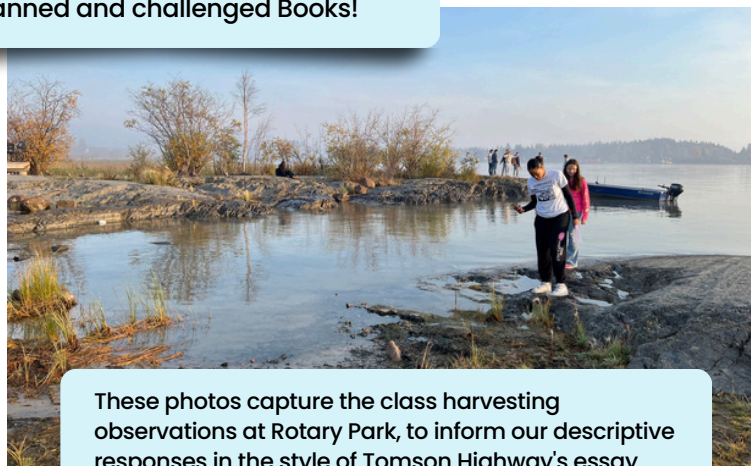

Are the two polar opposite groups banning similar types of books or opposite?

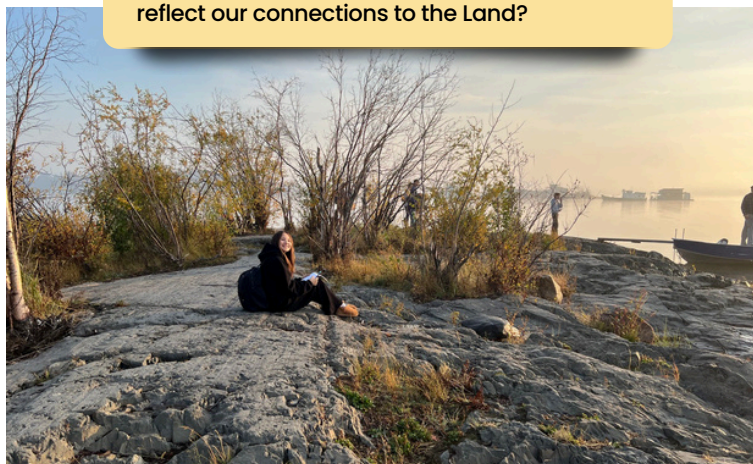
Students in Ms. Robson's **Literary Studies 11** were doing some amazing thinking as we explore the Freedom to Read and issues around banned and challenged Books!

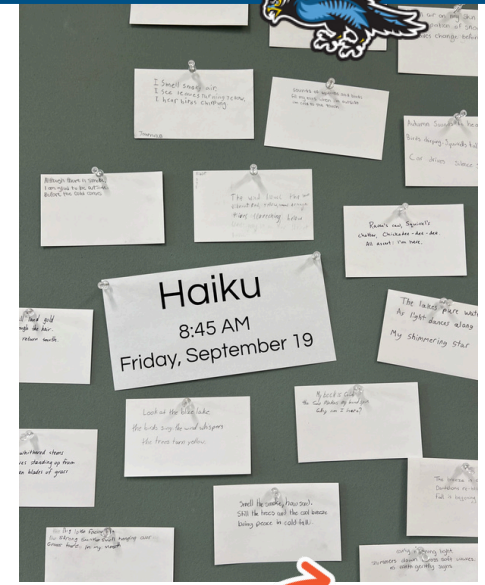
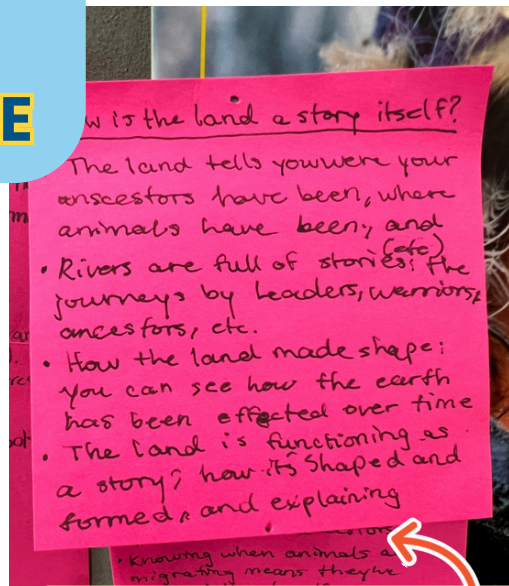
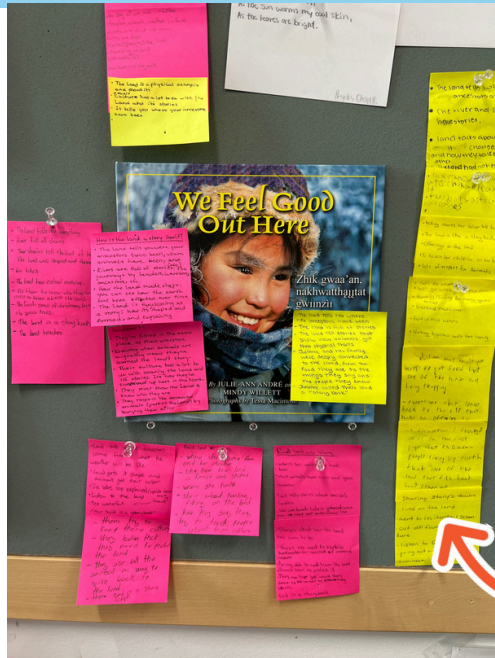

Open on weekdays from 8:15 AM to 4:00 PM

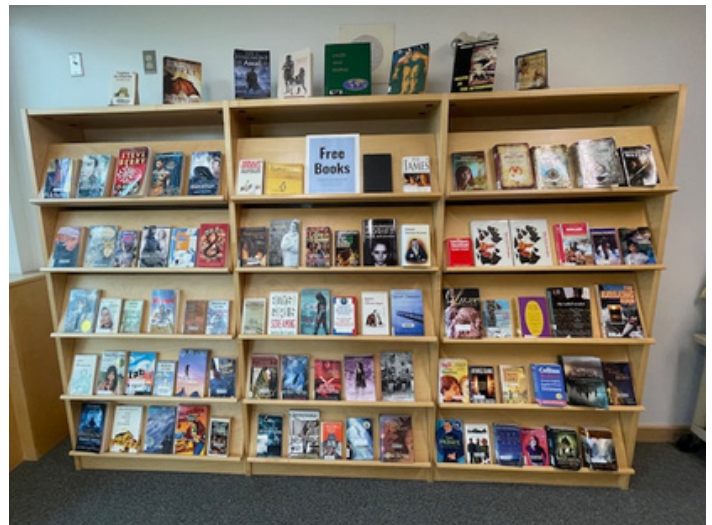
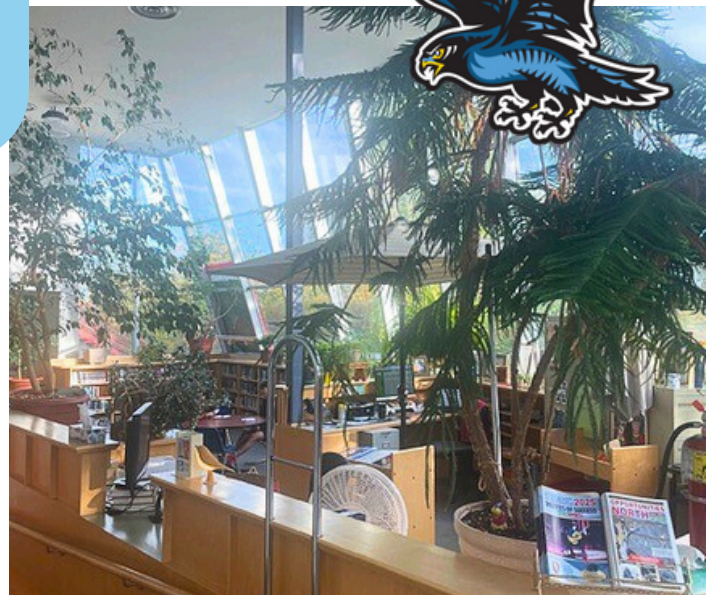

### NWT Minimum Graduation Requirements

The NWT will be moving from a 5-credit to 4-credit system; this simply means that the credit values for courses will change and does not reflect reduced academic expectations of students.

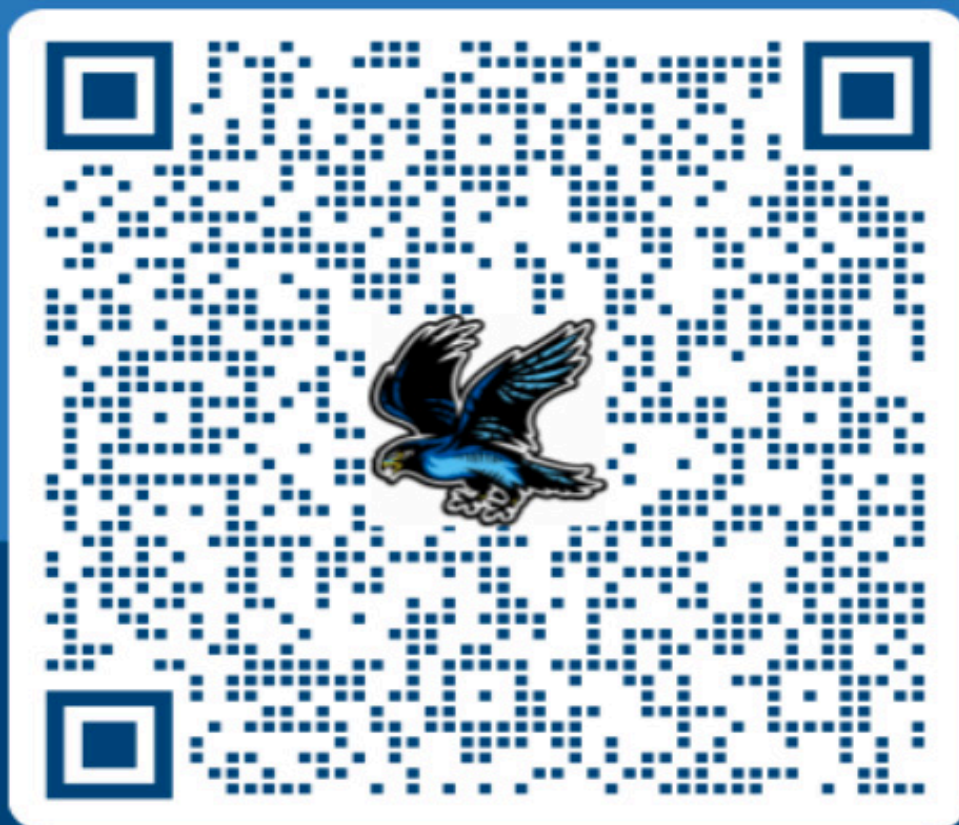
