

K&E students were rewarded with a fun trip to the snow castle! We explored local art, marveled at architecture and played like we were little again.


HEART DISSECTION

Ms. Waugh's K&E students experienced a moose heart dissection where science met culture! Students not only observed the dissection but were given a hands-on approach to learning. Students were able to get in and feel how all the parts of the heart are connected as they learned about pumps, valves, anatomy and how the circulatory system works. Students were also taught about traditional sustenance hunting and traditional tools used by northern indigenous peoples. After the dissection students helped Mr. Kooymans cook the moose heart over the open fire to later eat. Student's enjoyed the opportunity to share how their own families live off the land as we gathered around the fire.




Student Council News

The student council also ran a food and clothing drive and donated the goods to the Salvation Army and the Foodbank. Many thanks to all of the students, teachers and families who donated items.


Events for the Spring include a Carnival, Spirit Days and a Culture Week. Student Council events are advertised on Instagram and through posters around the school.


But I chose this drawing with both sketching and color use. I've included butterflies in several of my other drawings, and loved the idea of a scattered item.
